On Close Examination

When you have spent ten minutes with a parent and child, you can feel whether or not there is a healthy environment for growth and development. Now we are not looking at how much they know or even how informed they are in parenting skills. To be able to define technique and principle is useful and often saves a lot of time when faced with a problem. But there is something that runs much deeper; it is as deep as the soul. We see parents who are socially clumsy, intellectually slow, and couldn't discuss child training with any coherence at all; yet they are good parents, raising stable, contented kids.

On the other hand, we know of parents who are wise enough to provide stimulating and challenging conversation on points of child training, parents who could probably teach an impressive class on the subject. They have read several good books, retained most of what they read, and are very confident of their abilities. Yet,

as you see them relate to their children, you know they have problems that will lead to great disappointment.

What is the missing ele-



ment? It is a matter of the soul. We are not talking about religious indoctrination or spiritual airs; we are talking about the life and attitude that makes us who we are inside. In some homes you can sense that the parents and the children are just coexist-

ing. Out of the chance of nature they are sharing the same dwelling. They may maintain a compromising truce, bringing relative stability, but you know that what you are seeing are souls in competition. The parents have disciplined the children into subjection, but the children are not walking in the parents' light; they are walking around their parents' displeasure. There is no mutual respect and appreciation. The parent and child are walking separate paths. Due to the necessity of circumstances, their paths are running parallel, but they are not walking together, not in fellowship. They are all survivors. For practical purposes they have learned to get along with various degrees of give and take.

Then there are those relationships where parents seems to have invisible radio links to their children. It is like they were in constant communication. You sense that the parents' most important moment-by-moment task is to nurture their children. We

are not talking about constantly indulging, or even constant attention, but just an awareness of their child's soul. The parents are ever on guard, stimulating, challenging, teasing, encouraging, appreciating their children.

If you were to approach a child who is part of such a culturing relationship and ask, "What does your Mother/Father think about you? The child would unhesitatingly, and with a contented smile, tell you, "My Mama/Daddy thinks I am great." I am by no means suggesting it, but if you were to teasingly say,

"You are so much trouble, your mother is going to give you away." The child would not be angry. He/she would pity your ignorance or stupidity, condescendingly smiling at you as if to say, "Poor ignorant man; doesn't he know that my Mama would be unhappy without me?" How would your children answer if someone asked them how you felt about them?

Children who are tolerated and pacified feel insecure. They are angry. They come to such a frame of mind that if you told them their parents had decided to give them away, they would explode in anger, because they feel it could be true.

Only parents who feel desperate will admit to this condition. Many Christian homes are in this deplorable state. Busy, career absorbed parents speed along through life, take their children to church, send them to youth camp, go to an occasional ball game, take them to Disney World, restrict the kids' TV, ration the sweets, make sure they get a good education, spank them when they are young, and nag them when they get older. They watch them go through all the "stages," and then one day the parents stop long enough to exclaim, "That ungrateful kid! Well, I gave him/her everything. Why is he/she so angry? You

MARKETPLACE SUCCESS

Few parents have the bold confidence to care more for their children's happiness than for their marketplace success.

Marketplace success with all its inherent trappings seems to be the antitheses of happiness. No one ever wrote poetry about it. No one ever credited success with saving a marriage or encouraging the children. From the death bed we have never heard someone wishing they had spent more time in business. Success in the market place is its own end, valued for its inherent experience. It is hedonistic, a trip that is satisfying to the ego. If you fear you have allowed this condition to develop in your home, what can you do? You must change your entire philosophy of life. Your perspective and values must be revamped. Decide where your priorities lie. The key is to determine where you are going to invest your best emotional energy? When you can look in your child's face and smile with a genuine relaxed pleasure and delight, you have turned the corner to renewal. When you can get in touch with your child's soul and know that your hearts are beating together, you have conquered. To maintain that fellowship is the best of parenting, and the best of what

this life can offer.

Children are not deceived. They are great psychologists. They want to be loved, valued, appreciated, understood. Your conversion must reach all the way to the deepest recesses of your soul, or they will know you are fake.

John the Baptist, the forerunner of Christ, was given the ministry of preparing the nation of Israel for the coming of Messiah. His calling was "to turn the hearts of the fathers to the children, and the disobedient to the wisdom of the just; to make ready a people prepared for the Lord (Luke 1:17)." Fathers, Mothers also, your children need your heart. There is no substitute, no technique, no wisdom, no program that can take the place of the heart. Your intelligence and education alone are worthless. Psychology is a deceptive vanity. Techniques, including the ones we teach, are

paint brushes without artists. God breathed into us a living soul – making creatures with whom He can fellowship. If you would fellowship with your children, you must breath your soul into them.

You may need to make adjustments that allow you to have more relaxed time with the children. But sometimes the problem is deep in the soul of the parents. If you cannot be heart-to-heart with your children, because your heart is corrupt, you need to go to God in repentance. When you have peace with God, you will exude peace in the home. You will become approachable to your children. They will come to enjoy just spending time with you. You will become their best friend. ~



The Power of the Media

If you come to the Church which is at Cane Creek, and maybe hang around the volleyball court with your children, then you are eventually going to become the “star,” disreputable or otherwise, of one of our newsletter articles.

This week in our community, a little seven-year-old boy came to his mother and with cautious concern asked, “Mama, am I going to be in Mike Pearl’s news letter?” This family is not part of the local church, and I haven’t seen that little fellow in years, so the question must have been strange to his mother. She asked, “Why do you think you are going to be in the news letter?”

With foreboding, he then related an event that occurred earlier when he was playing with Clint, his seven-year-old cousin, whom I see most every day. As the story was told by Clint’s mother, here is what happened. Clint and his cousin developed a conflict of interests, with ensuing verbal differences, resulting in heated debate over personal priorities—nothing novel for two seven-year-olds. Their discussion was the foundation on which philosophy, dogmatic religion, and civil law are eventually forged. So Clint, with the brilliance of a logical tactician, resorting to his best argument, said, “If you don’t.....then I am going to

tell Mike Pearl and he will put you in the newsletter.” That did it. Clint’s threat won the day. What a deterrent! But I am afraid we are developing a new kind of childhood phobia. It will probably end up in the first year psychology books as “Publication exposure schizoid hyper self-imposed discipline mania.”



Several months ago we discovered another, far quicker, deterrent to public displays of negative emotion – otherwise know as throwing fits. We were keeping a little four-year-old girl when, to get her way, she suddenly resorted to her last-measure tactic. She stiffened and commenced to scream hysteri-

cally. It was obviously designed to cause us distress and deep concern – a poor judgment on her part. She looked as if she were totally lost to the insensitive world around her, submerged in her own vortex of emotional suffering and anguish; but not so much that she didn’t hear Deb say to Gabriel, “Go get the video camera, we need a picture of this.” She turned it off faster than an inflating air bag, sat up and asked, “Why are you getting the camera?” Deb answered, “Oh we are making a video on child training and we just need a few shots of kids throwing temper tantrums.” And then, with the arrival of the camera, Deb gave her the nod to resume her display, saying, “Go ahead.” As they all stood waiting, camera poised, faces anticipating good footage, the little girl, in a most controlled voice said, “No way,” and walked off with the utmost display of dignity and self-control. The best we can discern, she just didn’t want the publicity.

Do you suppose these out-of-control kids could really gain control of their emotions if they had sufficient motivation? The Psychologist may dub this one “Panasonic Panoramic Paranoia.” Who knows, a ready camera could rid us of ritalin—or perhaps just a threat to make their picture and story available to this newsletter. - **T. J. Slayman** will also be flying in from Laos for this conference. He will tell us of the ministry in Laos. He will be managing one of the boys' dorms.
- **Dr. Milton Martin**, an old veteran missionary with many years of experience among primitive tribes will be the main speaker. Through his ministry hundreds of Independent Baptist churches were started among the Indian tribes of Mexico.
- **Shad Williams** is a world missionary, ministering in India, Africa, and the Philippines. He will astound and challenge us with word, song, and pictures of the thousands that have trusted Christ through his ministry.
- **Michael Pearl** will be teaching twice each day, demonstrating the chronological method of teaching the Bible.
- **Steve Schnell**, one of our own, from Bible Baptist Translators in Bowie Texas, will be giving us a mini course in Linguistics and Translation. You will learn some of the techniques of language learning and Bible translation.
- **Many other missionaries** will be there to testify of their ministry.

The whole family is invited, but we are particularly interested in teenagers or young adults who have already shown an interest in missions. All Bible believing, fundamental missionaries are invited. For those interested in serving God this will be a thrilling experience. This is a how-to training for missionaries and would-be missionaries. This is not going to be a family-life or a child training camp. We are not inviting those who are having trouble with their teenagers. They will be bored with the seven hours of programming each day. Don't bring the unsaved or the carnal minded. We want only dedicated young people and adults. There will be recreational activities, but we are not arranging the camp to entertain. All young people should be accompanied by an adult. There will be no baby sitting. You will be responsible to maintain watch on your own children at all times. If your children cannot sit still for two hours at a time, you will be uncomfortable.

Camp NaCoMe

We have reserved the most beautiful camp grounds in Tennessee. It is just ten miles from our little community. It is nestled in a valley of giant oak trees with a crystal clear spring creek flowing through the middle of the camp. The stream ends in a deep blue lake sitting right in front of the cabins. The accommodations are grand (in a camp sort of way) and the food is sumptuous.

There are several quarters where whole families can stay together – first come basis. But in most cases, the men and boys will be quartered together and the girls and ladies will be quartered together. The large buildings are divided into small rooms that sleep four to eight with sufficient bath facilities in your own room or building. There are some very nice handicap rooms.

NaCoMe Camp is ten miles SW of Centerville TN, 80 miles west of Nashville, 180 miles east of Memphis. Registration will take place at 3:00 PM Tuesday, the 22nd of July. The camp will end, Friday, July 25th with the noon meal.

- \$75.00 for each person 12 and older,
- \$45.00 for those 3 - 11.
- No charge for those under three years

We are expecting to fill up the 365 beds in the camp. If you desire to register please send a deposit (check) of \$20.00 per adult (12 and older) and \$10.00 per child (3-11 years old). Include the name and age of each person coming and their family status.

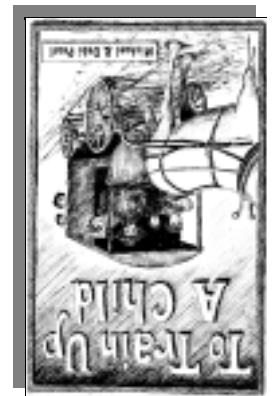
Our carnal union to Satan as benefactor of the flesh is a love/hate
